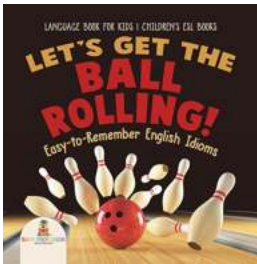

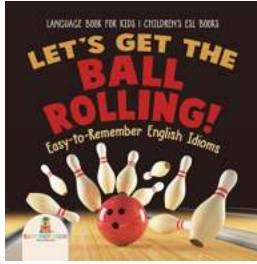
10. Actions Speak Louder than Words
