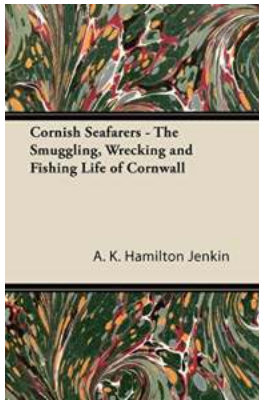

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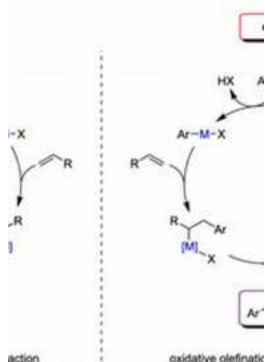

mining and published the classic text *The Cornish Miner* (1927). This rare text has been elected for modern republication due to its historical value, and is proudly republished here with a new to the subject.



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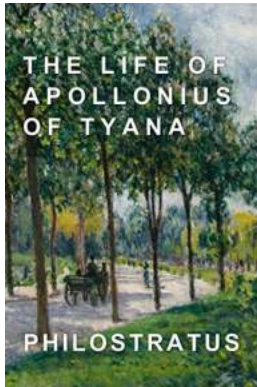
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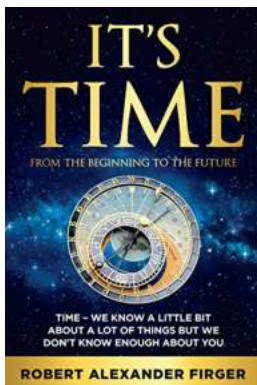
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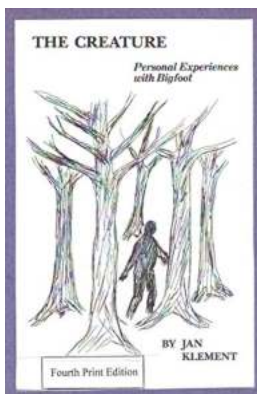
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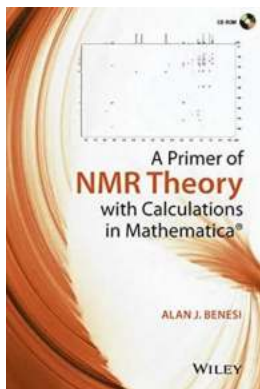
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
