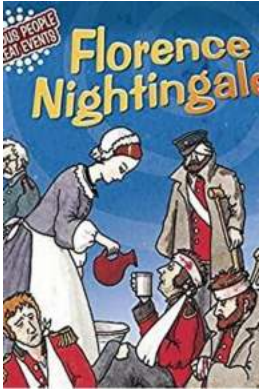

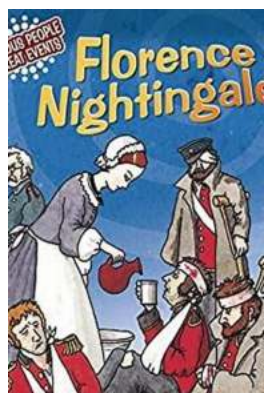

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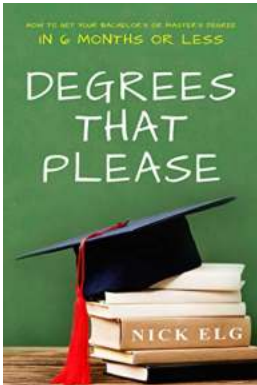

Each book includes a timeline of key dates, a quiz and index.



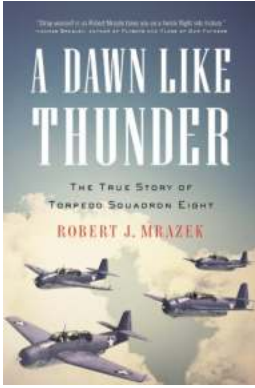
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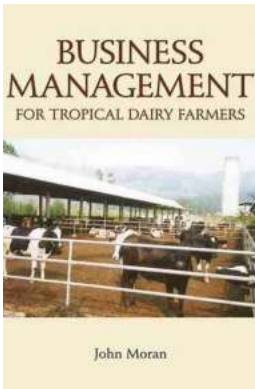
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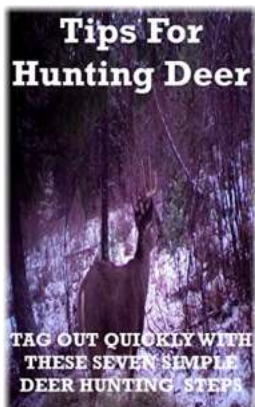
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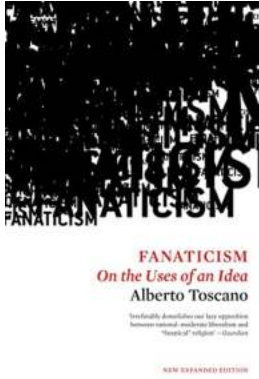
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
