



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This is a Lessons Learned report on the United States planning and execution of the Iraqi oil sector for Operation Iraqi Freedom. The report was submitted to the US Army in January 2006, but was not released to the public until June 2016.


It was written with input from the senior oil advisors to ORHA and CPA during 2003 and 2004. Input was also received from other senior officials within ORHA/CPA, a government contractor, and an Iraqi from the Ministry of Oil. It identifies the oil sector actions that worked well and those that did not.

The report covers the pre war planning by the Energy Infrastructure Planning Group (EIPG) during late 2002 and January 2003. This interagency planning cell had responsibility for developing the plans for Iraq's oil sector. Part of EIPG morphed into the Office of Reconstruction and Humanitarian Affairs (ORHA) under retired Lieutenant General Jay Garner. The report covers the continued planning and the eventual execution under ORHA.

The Coalition Provisional Authority (CPA) was organized in Baghdad under Ambassador Paul Bremer in May 2003 to replace ORHA. The execution of the oil plan transferred to CPA. The report covers the 13-month period under CPA, until June 2004.

Several pictures are included that were never before made public. Some are of the oil well fires, looting damage, oil team personnel, and key Iraqi officials in the Ministry of Oil.

An appendix in the report contains an action memo from Doug Feith to Donald Rumsfeld, dated 16 January 2003. The memo provided a summary of the contingency plans concerning the Iraqi oil infrastructure. It was declassified in May 2015 and contains some tidbits of information, such as the names of US oil industry executives and government officials that were considered for key positions in Iraq. It included the initial planning estimates of oil reconstruction costs and the limited funding that Iraq's oil revenues might provide.




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
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
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
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
