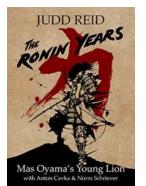

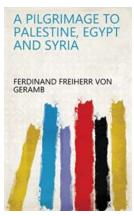
As a personal student of Sosai Mas Oyama, Judd knew it was his duty to carry on his teacher's legacy and share his wisdom.

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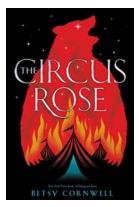
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
