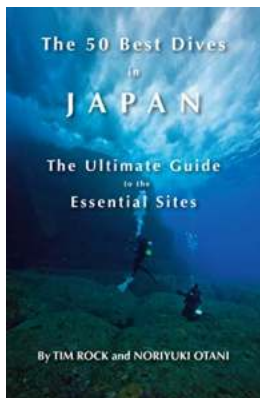

6. Ogasawara Islands

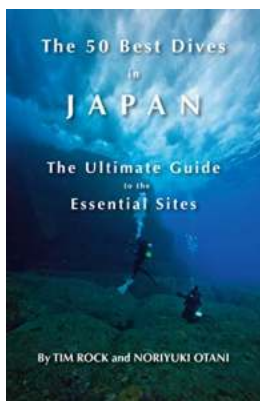
