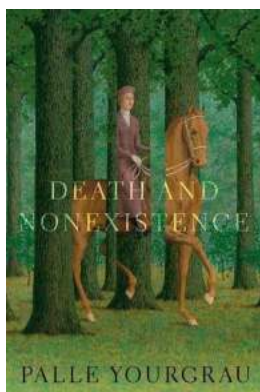

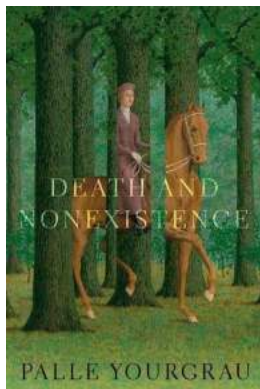

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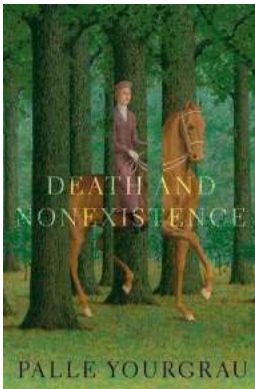
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The dead are gone. They count for nothing. Yet, if we count the dead, their number is staggering.
